

Jon Hall has spent the past 12 years trying to foster a more informed, evidence-based, discussion about the things that really matter to societies.

Since the end of 2009 he has been working for PARIS21, the Partnership in Statistics for Development in the 21st Century, at the OECD, where he is helping to improve the use and production of statistics in some of the poorest countries in Asia, the Pacific and the Arab region.

Jon joined the OECD in 2005 to start the "Global Project on Measuring the Progress of Societies", and led the project until the end of 2009. He came to the OECD from the Australian Bureau of Statistics where he spent seven years, mainly leading a ground-breaking project to publish the first set of measures of Australia's progress, a publication that went on to top the Bulletin magazine's social category in their 'Smart 100' awards.

He has a degree in maths and a master's degree in statistics from the UK and an executive masters in public service administration from the Australian and New Zealand School of Government.

An Australian and British citizen, Jon has also worked for the British public service, and for the World Food Program in Zambia.

In his spare time, he runs a website – <u>www.mammalwatching.com</u> - on where to watch mammals in the wild and having just seen his 1000th species in the wild believes he should be in the Guiness Book of Records!
